







Foreword

I am pleased to report that despite the ongoing pandemic, the University of Vienna succeeded in taking two landmark steps in participating in and building European networks in 2021: we took over the coordination of the CENTRAL Network for the next four years, and joined the European University Alliance Circle U.

CENTRAL is a scientific network of five renowned Central European universities that aims to promote Central Europe as a hub for academic excellence. We have taken over the coordinating role from Humboldt University in Berlin, and together with our partners in Prague, Warsaw and Budapest, we are expanding our collaboration beyond research activities to include joint cultural events and third mission initiatives too. A highlight in the field of cultural exchange was an exhibition on the Vienna Circle, a highly influential school of science philosophy in the interwar period that laid the foundation for modern science as we know it today. The exhibition was opened at Charles University in Prague in October 2021 and will go on tour in 2022. The exhibition will next be shown at Warsaw University and subsequently at the Humboldt Forum in Berlin.

Joining Circle U. is a major step forward in the University of Vienna's internationalisation strategy. It marks a step change in our cooperation with eight renowned, research-intensive European universities. These universities are determined to create strong mutual ties in teaching, research and administration. From 2022 onwards, Circle U. will bring new opportunities for mobility and innovative ways for students, staff and external stakeholders to co-create knowledge

and conduct problem-oriented research on sustainability, health and democracy. This long-term partnership with our partners in Circle U. reinforces the University of Vienna's identity as a truly European university.

The Covid 19 pandemic unfortunately continued to hinder many international activities in 2021. Sadly, this year's International Report shows a sharp drop in mobility figures within student and staff mobility programmes, resulting from international travel restrictions and repeated lockdowns. We are optimistic that physical mobility will pick up again in 2022, especially within Europe.

Important lessons are to be learned from almost two years of pandemic conditions. These include novel digital formats in international exchange and in teaching and learning. For example, we have held very successful webinars with our strategic partners, such as the Fudan-Vienna Strategic Partners Week or the joint CENTRAL Staff Development Webinar. In addition, the University of Vienna has further strengthened dissemination of know-how on COIL (Collaborative Online International Learning) among its teaching staff. These new experiences and innovative formats bring new inspiration and ideas for international cooperation and exchange that are here to stay. For example, we are now planning to devise new forms of blended mobility combining virtual mobility and short physical stays, which will benefit students and researchers in the post-pandemic period too.







Beyond Facts and Figures: Internationalisation Activities of the International Office 2021

Aside from internationalisation activities that can be measured in figures, the International Office of the University of Vienna focused on several additional key areas of the university's internationalisation strategy in 2021: the **Strategic Partnerships**, the **CENTRAL Network** and the development of knowhow in the area of **COIL** (Collaborative Online International Learning). In addition, preparations were made for the University of Vienna to join the renowned **European University Alliance Circle U.**

Strategic Partnerships

Within the framework of its Strategic Partnerships, the University of Vienna has intensified its cooperation with five top universities in China, Israel, Japan and the USA since 2015. The aim is to achieve particularly close and sustainable networking in research, as well as in the areas of teaching, studies and administration.

In 2021, a whole series of planned cooperation measures had to be cancelled or postponed due to the pandemic. In order to continue collaboration with the strategic partner universities, activities were moved into the digital space and new virtual formats were developed. Thus, bilateral online workshops and seminars provided important new impetus for intensified cooperation in research and teaching. Joint learning and teaching with the Strategic Partner Universities also took place primarily virtually, including in the form of digital guest professorships and guest lectures, as well as participation in virtual short-term study programmes such as summer or winter schools.

CENTRAL Network

CENTRAL is a scientific network of five renowned
Central European universities that aims to promote
Central Europe as a hub for academic excellence.
The network is composed of the Charles University in
Prague, University of Warsaw, University of Vienna,
ELTE Budapest as well as Humboldt-Universität zu
Berlin. In 2021, the University of Vienna took over the
coordination of the CENTRAL network from HU Berlin.

The previous set of activities (such as workshops) was expanded to include joint cultural events and Third Mission initiatives. The first cooperation activity in the field of cultural exchange involved the University of Vienna's exhibition on the Vienna Circle – a school of science philosophy which exerted influence beyond the entire region in the interwar period – which was sent on tour and opened at Charles University in Prague in October 2021. After Prague, the exhibition will travel to Warsaw.

A joint annual theme with relevance for all partners ties together the CENTRAL universities' activities. 2021's theme, "what unites and divides us?", has been accompanied by a series of interviews and articles in cooperation with local radio channels and newspapers, including a series of articles on the anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall on 9 November 1989.

Circle U.

The University of Vienna is pleased to have joined the European University Alliance Circle U. together with the University of Pisa on 12 November 2021. Joining this prestigious European University Alliance represents a major step forward in the University of Vienna's internationalisation process and opens up new horizons for study, research and international cooperation.

Circle U. is a network of research-intensive universities from across Europe with seven founding members: Aarhus University, Humboldt-University Berlin, Université de Paris, University of Belgrade, UCLouvain, University of Oslo und King's College London. The aim of Circle U. is to create an inclusive European University in which students, staff and external partners collaborate to develop competencies and solutions for a healthy, peaceful, democratic and prosperous society. In 2021, the University of Vienna worked with Circle U. partners to integrate into the alliance and determine initial areas of focus for its membership. Two professors have already been nominated "Academic Chairs" to lead the University of Vienna's contribution to Circle U. on the topics of climate change and democracy.

COIL: Collaborative Online International Learning

The coronavirus pandemic has brought a worldwide boost to remote teaching and distance learning – both for regular teaching at universities, which could not take place physically at times due to lockdowns, and for academic mobility programmes, which could hardly take place due to international travel restrictions.

Among the various options for virtual collaboration, the University of Vienna has focused on COIL (Collaborative Online International Learning). COIL enables low-threshold collaboration between teachers at universities in different countries. Joint online teaching units and interactive assignments for students in internationally mixed teams enable international and intercultural experiences.

In order to disseminate COIL at the University of Vienna, practice-oriented webinars on didactic, technical and institutional aspects of COIL were offered in the continuing education programme for staff.

Accompanying awareness measures and support for COIL courses by tutors aim to increase interest in COIL courses.

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Key figures for internationalisation activities at the University of Vienna

Since 2008 the internationalisation of the University of Vienna has been measured by a set of indicators relating to the areas of study and teaching, staff and research. The figures given are an attempt to quantify central aspects of internationalisation in these areas and to permit an annual comparison of the development of the internationalisation activities.

Degree-seeking students


Active students at the University of Vienna by country of origin

(As of winter semester 2019/20)

This important indicator measures the share of non-Austrian students in order to determine how attractive the University of Vienna is for international students as a place of education and research. International students constitute 29.5% of all active students (> 16 ECTS), a slight increase compared to the previous year (2018/19: 29%), see figure 1b.

A Bachelor's, diploma or Master's programme is considered active if the student has acquired at least 16 ECTS credits in the respective academic year. A student may be enrolled in more than one active programme during the applicable academic year. Doctoral students are not included in these figures.

Students at the University of Vienna come from 125 countries. 91% of all active international students are from Europe (incl. Russian Federation), 6% from Asia, slightly more than 1% each from North and Latin America, and the last 1% is split between Africa and Australia/Oceania. Half of all international students (54%) are from neighbouring countries, with students from Germany making up the largest group at 37% of all international students. Students from successor states of former Yugoslavia constitute 11% of all international students.





43% of all doctoral students come from abroad. Changes in the conditions for admissions have resulted in a decrease in the number of newly admitted doctoral students since 2018/19 (both Austrian and international students). This clearly has – and will continue to have – an impact on the total number of doctoral students, see figure 2. However, selecting applicants on the basis of quality ensures that newly admitted doctoral candidates are better prepared as they start their studies.



Doctoral Schools at the University of Vienna

Training the next generation of researchers and supporting young talent to become independent and internationally competitive is a central mission of the University of Vienna. In 2020, the university established 15 doctoral schools that offer early-stage researchers the opportunity to participate in cutting-edge research within structured programmes. These doctoral schools attract young talent from all over the world. Researchers in turn benefit from excellent hosting conditions, e.g. quality team supervision and funding opportunities. This enables PhD candidates to carry out excellent research and prepares them for a wide range of careers and responsibilities.


Highly competitive programmes

As an Example: Doctoral School "Vienna International School of Earth and Space Sciences"

This doctoral school at the Faculty of Earth Sciences, Geography and Astronomy addresses grand challenges of humanity such as resource depletion, climate change, and insecurity about our future energy supply. It carries out inter- and trans-disciplinary academic research connecting the cosmos with planets and atmospheres, including its environments and the anthroposphere.

During the first recruitment round, 472 candidates, many of them from outside Europe, applied for 18 funded PhD positions , demonstrating the significant degree of interest in this PhD programme. More than half (56%) of the applications were submitted by graduates from universities in third countries. 31% of the applicants graduated at universities in Europe (excl. AT and DE) and only 13 % came from Germany or Austria.

Master's programmes in English

Of the 108 Master's programmes at the University of Vienna, 29 can be studied entirely in English (= 27%). English-language Master's programmes are not only attractive to international students, but also prepare the university's students for an international working environment in business and science.

Credit mobility

Credit mobility can be defined as a limited period of study or traineeship abroad (in the framework of on-going studies at a home institution) for the purpose of gaining credits. After the mobility phase, students return to their "home institution" to complete their studies.

Graduates of the University of Vienna 2018/19 with stays abroad during their studies

In a survey, Statistics Austria asked all 9,690 students who graduated in the academic year 2018/19 whether they had studied abroad during their studies.

1,690 (19%) had spent time abroad during their studies. This represents a slight decrease in the percentage of graduates with experience abroad during their studies (2017/18: 21.5%), see figure 4a.

With regard to the number of graduates from the various disciplines, graduates of social sciences and humanities were the most mobile. Nevertheless, there has been a decline in mobility in these two branches compared to the previous year, while the percentages of graduates with stays abroad in natural and technical sciences have slightly increased.

The stage of studies and the type of curricula significantly influence the probability of a stay abroad. Generally speaking, it can be observed that a higher percentage of graduates from diploma, Master's and doctoral programmes complete a stay abroad than graduates from Bachelor's programmes, see figure 4b. This can easily be explained by tighter curricula at Bachelor's level and the students' ambitions to complete their studies within the shortest possible time.

Erasmus+ programme

The university offers several mobility programmes for students that allow them to spend one or two semesters at a partner university. The best-known programme is the Erasmus+ programme (for periods of study abroad in Europe).

In recent years, the University of Vienna has been among the top European universities in terms of numbers of outgoing and incoming students within the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme.

However, the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on mobility figures was, as expected, particularly evident in the academic year 2020/21. Lockdowns in autumn 2020 as well as travel restrictions in numerous countries led to a sharp decline in numbers. The total number of outgoing students dropped significantly from 851 (in 2019/20) to 208 (in 2020/21). The number of incoming students decreased from 964 (in 2019/20) to 661 (in 2020/21). Many planned stays abroad had to be postponed or cancelled.


The new Erasmus+ Programme generation (2021–2027) includes opportunities for blended mobility, e.g. the new Blended Intensive Programmes. These initiatives have greatly profited from the breadth of experience gained during the pandemic in terms of distance learning. We expect that virtual mobility, especially blended mobility with online and face-to-face phases at a host university, will increase in the wake of the current pandemic.



Erasmus+* outgoing students by destination (Top 10)



208 students of the University of Vienna benefitted from an Erasmus+ stay abroad in 2020/21. The most popular destinations in the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme remain Germany, France, Denmark and Spain; these countries account for 53% of all outgoing students, see figure 5a. Student exchange with Italy, the UK and Sweden (usually among the top 10 destinations) was heavily affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.






661 international students studied at the University of Vienna under the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme in 2020/21. The top 5 countries have not changed: Germany, France, Italy, Spain and the United Kingdom. More than 60% of the incoming Erasmus+ students come from these five countries, see figure 5b.

Erasmus+ internships

Within the Erasmus+ Programme, students of the University of Vienna can also apply for a scholarship for a self-organised internship relevant to their studies in one of the European countries which participate in the Erasmus+ programme. The constant popularity of this programme can be explained by its flexibility: applications are possible all year long (no application deadlines), the time required for processing applications is short, and students can choose how long their internships will be (at least 2 months).

However, this programme also saw a significant drop in the number of applications in 2020/21 due to the Covid-19 pandemic, see figure 6. The most popular destination country continues to be Germany, where half of all internships were completed.







Non-EU Student Exchange Program

An important element of the University of Vienna's mobility programmes is the Non-EU Student Exchange Program. This scheme has supported student exchange since 1992, primarily with universities outside of the EU.

Due to the difficult conditions for long-distance travel, this programme was hit especially hard by the pandemic. Only two dozen exchanges took place within this programme in 2020/21. We expect both incoming and outgoing numbers to return to pre-crisis levels soon (~230 incoming students from outside the EU, ~150 outgoing students).

Short Term Grants Abroad ("KWA-Programme")

The KWA Programme (short-term grants abroad) provides funding for Master's and PhD students if they need to conduct research (e.g. laboratory work, field studies, research in archives, libraries, academic collections, etc.) outside Austria as part of their diploma/Master's thesis or PhD (duration: between 2 weeks and 3 months).



The Covid-19 pandemic has had a strong impact on the programme for short-term grants abroad, as a large number of stays was supposed to take place while lockdowns and subsequent travel restrictions were in force. Due to the nature of the programme, the majority of research projects relied on actual stays on site and could not be replaced by online activities. Nevertheless, three students found a way to conduct their research online and/or with the help of local representatives that provided support in the target country.

The number of applications in the academic year 2020/21 decreased again compared to the previous year due to the ongoing pandemic and travel restrictions, see figure 7. Most stays were postponed to the next semester or even to the next academic year.

Teaching and Staff

Over the last few years, the share of international academic staff has risen steadily. Currently, 46% of academic staff were employed outside Austria before joining the University of Vienna, see figure 8.







Figure 9 Appointments from abroad in % 2016–2020



Source: Reporting System of the University of Vienna / calculation: International Office 74% of the professors appointed in 2020 were appointed from universities or other institutions abroad, clearly demonstrating that, in this regard, the University of Vienna has achieved its goal of becoming attractive to international academics. More than half of all appointments were from EU countries other than Austria (with a significant emphasis on Germany) and 21% were from outside the EU, see figure 9.

Erasmus+ Teaching Mobility

Erasmus+ Teaching Mobility is one of the core mobility schemes in the Erasmus+ programme. It offers short term teaching visits for the University of Vienna's teaching staff to Erasmus+ universities in the EU. In the academic year 2020/21, teaching mobility was not possible due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. At the moment, teaching mobility is taking place again. We expect to regain pre-crisis levels in mobility soon (~125 places), provided there are no further travel restrictions.



Partnerships

Currently the University of Vienna has a set of 88 partners at university-wide level, see figure 10. Bilateral university wide partners include the five strategic partner universities: the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, the University of Chicago, as well as the recently established partnerships with Peking University, Fudan University and Kyoto University. Further partners outside Europe include, among others: Stanford University, Australian National University, University of Toronto and Seoul National University.

The University of Vienna follows an internationalisation strategy which involves developing only a limited number of partnerships, but ensuring that these are of high impact. At university-wide level, the University of Vienna strives for cooperation with top-class universities in Asia, North America, Australia and Europe. In addition to the academic reputation of the partner university, common research and teaching interests and existing faculty links are a prerequisite for the conclusion of an agreement with a partner university.

In Europe, the strategic focus of the University of Vienna's cooperation is on multilateral strategic partnership networks, such as the CENTRAL network (ELTE, HU Berlin, Charles University Prague, University of Warsaw, University of Vienna) and Circle U., a European University Alliance with eight other research-intensive partner universities from across Europe (Aarhus University, Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, King's College London, Université de Paris, University of Belgrade, University of Louvain, University of Oslo and University of Pisa).





In 2020, the University of Vienna was more successful than ever in attracting R&D projects. However, due to the Covid-19 pandemic and the associated restrictions on the implementation of research projects, the funding could not be spent as planned. Reported R&D project totals therefore fell by just under 4% to € 80.6 million compared to the high level of the previous years, see figure 11.



International co-publications

The strong international orientation of research at the University of Vienna is reflected in the number of international co-publications (see figure 12a and b). The number of international co-publications (Web of Science) is high and following a continuous upward trend (2020: 70.7% International co-publications, constituting a top score in an international benchmark).


